

Bull and Ram Fertility Testing

Did you know that a bull will naturally become less fertile after the age of 6 years? Very often, the breeding potential of the males in the herd and flock is not assessed. When we consider that the bull or tup is responsible for 50% of the potential to conceive, this leaves a lot to chance. Over the past 12 months, we have been performing more fertility testing and have been interested to see that many breeding decisions have been subsequently made off the back of the results that we have found. You'll never regret making a pre-emptive decision for the fertility of your herd or flock, however many find themselves regretting the consequences of discovering infertility after the breeding has finished or is underway.

What does a bull/ram fertility consist of?

- Full clinical examination, checking animals ability to move, eat, see.
- Examination of reproductive tract.
- Electroejaculation and analysis of semen sample, looking at gross motility, progressive motility and morphology of semen.



What do you need?

- An electricity source in a nice, sheltered spot (ideally not too far from the handling system)
- A well-functioning crush or way of restraining rams at the neck
- Assistance to keep the probe in place
- Daylight hours to be reducing (after the summer solstice) for rams

If you have multiple bulls or rams to test, the cost reduces for subsequent testing.

Barren Ewe Screening

Have you got empty ewes who should have lambed?

It's important to investigate why ewes didn't get in lamb or have lost lambs since scanning. There is funding available for testing for Enzootic abortion and Toxoplasmosis – 2 of the most common causes of abortions in the UK.

Semen Straw Testing

We will be offering the option to perform dynamic motility testing over a 2-hour period on semen straws in April. Provisional results are showing that semen that remain motile for over 2hrs can increase conception rates in the region of 8%. Don't miss out on adding this to your herd!
